

The spirit of KCJ (Keymen's Club of Japan)

We, the members of Keymen's Club of Japan, KCJ, are the enthusiasts of CW communication. We always try to improve our CW skill, and consider ourselves as belonging to the best Amateurs. KCJ was founded in 1976, and we recently have approximately 160 members in the Club. Although the membership has been restricted to the Amateurs living in Japan until now, we would like to invite to this Club as associate members all of the Amateurs around the World who are eagerly interested in CW.

"Key" means, of course, an essential device for CW. At the same time, this word has the meaning of "an important person". The Club name, KCJ, has been designated to make it that all of the members are the best CW men and do their best to be keystones of the amateur radio communities. Actually, some of members are serving as leaders of their regional amateur radio communities.

This is a Club rather for those who want to pursue Amateur Radio as a lifetime hobby, particularly through CW communication.

CW is the simplest and yet the most reliable communication modality which makes it able us to talk to people living in the other end of world merely by means of intermittent electromagnetic wave. As you know, CW is not an efficient way as compared to the phone, and all of us may have had some difficulty to tell what we really think about. (Of course this is, in part, due to the language problem.) Because of its inefficiency, we use abbreviated words and sentences in the communication, and thus CW communication sometimes requires us imagination to compensate words between sentences which makes an additional interest on CW communication. That is why we are attracted by CW more than Phone.

Many young new comers join the world of Amateur Radio every year. However, considerable number of them loses their interest in Radio in a while because they may have hobbies other than Amateur Radio at the same time and they do not consider Amateur Radio as their lifetime hobby. They need to mature to recognize what is important for them or what they are interested in after all. Now as you can see, KCJ is the club of matured people who know that Radio, especially CW, is one of their major favorites for whole their life.

Although we really love CW, we will not deny those who enjoy other modes or modalities in Amateur Radio. We are rather proud of members having

non-CW activities as well. We believe that all of the Amateurs will come back their home, a wonderful world of CW!

Activities of KCJ

KCJ provides Amateurs with tips to enjoy CW communication. Listed below is what this Club is doing:

(1) Issue an award, Keymen's Century of Japan (KCJA).

There are numerous awards or certificates issued for the Amateurs in the world. Some of them are easy to be obtained without even a little effort and some are extremely difficult to be qualified. These kinds of awards are far from a fun. The rules of KCJA are quite simple but require good and worthy effort. QSLs from 100 prefectures of Japan are the minimal requirement for the basic KCJA. Of course, QSOs should be made in CW. Because there are only 47 prefectures in Japan, multi-band QSOs are essential. We have already had many foreign amateurs who have been certified with several hundreds QSOs. KCJ provides the application form at the web site, <http://www.kcj-cw.com/>.

(2) Organize CW contests.

A unique contest, KCJ contest, is held in every August. This contest is getting to be one of the major CW contests among Japanese testers.

An exchange consists of RST and two characters which stand for a prefecture name. This makes a contact short and gives participants the likelihood of QSOs at high rate. KCJ contest used to be a kind of domestic contest. However, we recently have an increasing number of foreign participants enjoying this contest.

All of the participants are required to submit their logs to the KCJ contest committee. One of the most important features of this contest is that all of the submitted logs are crosschecked for all QSOs to observe their data appearing in the log of the others. If QSO data are not concordant with each other, these QSOs are disqualified and omitted for the calculation of the final scores. Therefore, if you won't submit your logs after the participation in the contest or if you will submit irresponsible logs, you will make troubles to other participants.

Some Amateurs do not know that they may cause troubles on the band because of their selfish or imprudent behaviors. Contesting is a kind of recreation but has its regulations to be strictly followed. We think that amateur radio activities including a contest cannot be a good pleasure without an order. However, a lot of unlawful operations are actually found in various settings both

in ordinal and contest scenes. We intend to clean these violations out from the band through the KCJ contest and KCJ TOP band contest.
