Mr. President, thank you very much for your email today with the news that my application for membership in the Keymen's Club of Japan has been accepted. It is a great honor to belong to KCJ, a Japanese fraternity of CW aficionados, operators who are dedicated to maintaining and fostering the venerable traditions of the A1 mode of radio communication, the true original mode of amateur radio.

May I take this opportunity of briefly introducing myself. I am an Old Timer aged 72, and licensed since 1959. But my introduction to amateur radio dates back to 1957 when I became a Short Wave Lister (SWL) and

started listening to ham radio stations on the shortwave bands. In the process I learned Morse code and also studied theory, ultimately passing a ham radio licensing exam in 1959.

Three years later I graduated from high school and entered Helsinki University to study English philology, earning my Bachelor of Arts degree in 1967. In 1968 I was employed by the British Embassy in Helsinki as a researcher/translator and worked at the British Embassy for nearly 40 years, retiring in 2005.

All these years I have been active on the bands, using the CW mode. I do have a microphone somewhere, hidden in a drawer but I do not use it.... Besides CW, my interest is focused on DX, which has kept me busy all this time. I have worked and confirmed all 341 current countries on CW to qualify for the DXCC #1 Honor Roll as well as the CQ DX Honor Roll. In



more recent years, I have also become increasingly active in various CW contests not scoring any spectacular triumphs but working casually as many contacts as I reasonably can. With this in mind, it was a pleasure to join last weekend's KCJ contest and work a fair number of JA stations, particularly on 15 meters.

I look forward to meeting many KCJ members from now on. Please listen for OH2BN. It should be easy to contact me on 20 and/or 15 meters; 10 meters is no good at this time. My station consists of a Yaesu FT-1000MP Mark-V Field and an Italian-made solid-state amplifier (SPE Expert 1K-FA) and the antenna is a Hy-Gain 12-AVQ vertical.



formal assignment.

I just transferred here from Chiba prefecture a few months ago and wanted to get used to job. However, I rarely have an opportunity like this, so I have been on the air to come up to the expectation of IOTA chasers. On August 4, I got a big EU pile up for two hours. I managed to work 1000 unique QSOs for about one month.



Now many SASE are arriving at me. I run 50 W to a wire antenna.

CW WAJA on 144 MHz

Last one for 144 MHz CW WAJA was Kagoshima prefecture. I scheduled with JE6BPK/6 on July 27, 2014. I adjusted the time of my watch, the direction of my antenna and receiving frequency. At first, faint beats began to be heard and after fine adjustments of the direction of beam antennas, his signals got clearer. I worked him. I confirmed his card by SASE and applied CW WAJA on 144MHz to JARL. JARL said this is the first time 144MHz CW WAJA.

Sepia Reminiscence

JA7AEM T. Higuchi

After my Koki (old Japanese age counting way, 70 year old), I bring out memories

Crystal Radio;

My beginning to be a ham came from a crystal radio of my father more than 60 years ago. A large coil was set horizontally in a wood box covered with velvet. Tuning was done by rotating the coil. A crystal detector had a small hole through which the contact of a spring to the crystal was adjusted with a pin to get high sensitivity.

Observatory;

I belonged to a science club in a junior high school because I was interested in electricity, astronomy and meteorology. I made meteorological observation every day. There existed an observatory next to my school. When I visited there, I watched that its staff sent the observation results by CW. I thought it was cool and was completely drawn by it. I home-brewed 0-V-1 and started to be a SWL.

Soon I became to know the amateur radio. After I entered in a high school for wireless operators, my RX evolved to a five tube super-heterodyne RX and further to better one, with one stage RF and two stage IF amplifiers. I learned CW and thereafter exclusively heard CW.

I graduated the high school and got a job at a land-line communication company. When I became used to my job, I applied a station license. It was on 7, 14, and 21 MHz with 10 watts output power. In March 1960, I had a station JA7AEM. Photo on the right side was my shack in 1960.

Hans and Renate

I received an air-mail of DJ4GU Hans whom I had reported before. He said he had not worked JA on 40 meters. That his signal reached JA was good for him of 50 watts and a wire antenna and his desire to work JA would be realized in future. I thought at the moment he was one of kind hams who sent a QSL card direct.

Later I received an air-mail again. This letter was from Renate a sister of DJ4GU. She had been thinking that she would like to be a pen pal of a foreign person to study English and asked me to write her. I said OK and I had kept in touch with her three, four times a year. Our correspondence continued four years. When I got call sign JA7AEM, I asked her to pass this to her brother Hans. I have not worked him. I run into a tentative QRT. Nowadays internet is developing, so, maybe, I can find the way to contact with them but I rather remember these as memories of a half century ago.



JA7AEM again and QRO

During two year QRT, reading JA CQ magazine in a commuting train inspired me to be a ham again. This time, my station consisted of manufacturer made 150 watts rigs. In 1967 I thought 150 watts output power was not enough to enjoy ham radio, so I got 500 watts license. Recent my QRV, however, was done with 100 watts on CW mode.

Although I retired in 2003, I don't have enough free time for ham. In order to continue the activity of ham radio, I set an object. Because I don't interest in award and have no big antennas, the object was 500 QSOs/month. Recent several years except the earthquake year, I have achieved my objectives by participating in contests, chasing mobile stations and making mobile operations by myself.

Acknowledgements

In the great earth quake of East Japan on March 11 2011, I suffered from flood one meter above the floor due to Tsunami. Furniture and appliances on the first floor got damaged. It was several days after flood that I came back to my house by a boat of Japanese Self Defense Army. In my city Ishinomaki, dead and lost people were largest in number. The city has still been under reconstruction. Around my house there remain many vacant lots. Fortunately my shack on a second floor was safe and I was able to get on the air at ALL JA contest held in the end of April that year to show I was safe and vigorous for ham radio activity. I was encouraged by the word, "cheer up", after exchanges of contest number.

I want to acknowledge to those who sent JA CQ magazine to hams in this city for two months, presented rigs to a flood victim in my local and so on. I, AGAIN, EXPRESS DEEP GRATITUDES FOR THESE SUPPORTS.

Voice of Member

JQ1NGT: Participated in WPX CW Test on 21 MHz. The propagation of ten meter band was not good compared with that in Phone section held in March. I wondered why some JA participants exclusively worked only DX. This was not good tactics for contests, I think.

7N3SHX: When I have free time, I stayed in my shack and listened to 7 MHz with sweating. No air conditioning there.

JA2MYA: Recent condition has not good for DX, so I chased mobile stations and special call sign stations.

JA2OLJ: This year I was so terribly suffered from hay fever that my throat

was unusual even in July. Another hobby of mine is to keep a vegetable garden. I went to my garden every early morning and pollinated pumpkin.

I heard EU for the first time on 6 meters in July. It was very impressive that their signals gradually increased in strength like thing rose to the surface.

JS2KHM: It was too hot to enjoy ham radio. I had no air conditioning in my shack, so using three electric fans, I took chilly air n my shack from a room where an air conditioner is.

JA3VOV: Because a weather forecast said that typhoon eight would hit Osaka, I pull down all my antennas. Thus, this caused my activity down. Now I reconstructed 40 and 20 meters antennas and was on the air on weekend.

JH3HGI: Uhm my antenna Do you understand what it means? Being aroused my interest for DXing, I have working DX every early morning, around four o'clock in local time, from the end of this February. I worked at least one DX contact per one day but it is hard with my Butternut vertical antenna. Sometimes I heard a QSO of my local JG3LGD. When he sent 579 to DX station, I heard that station with difficulty. The antenna of JG3LGD is a beam antenna and mine is a vertical one on the ground. This caused I said uhm my antenna.....

JI3NOF: I am active on DX hunting only on 40 meters. One band QRV doesn't cause a KCJA score to increase.

JG6CDH: I got productive results this month, too. By accident I worked with FM mode on 28 MHz. Maybe this will become new entertainment in future. Recently DX QSL cards via JARL started to reach me. This also is my other enjoyment.

JA7TJ: I confirmed ZB2CW six months after QSO. My score of DXCC is 227. With a wire antenna, I used to get only one or two DXCC score up a year.

JG7UVO: At last I confirmed 30 entities with five watts output power and a wire antenna.

JA8AJE: At last Es season came. I worked stations outside of Hokkaido by Es propagation on May this year. I thought this year Es happened earlier than usual year but checking out logs I found Es propagation happened on May last year. I hope Es season continues until the moment of KCJ contest.

JA8PON: I often operated from guns for WAGA of F6EMA. However, I cannot go and operate at Rebutun gun. If someone has a plan to go there, please schedules with him.
